
ENLIVENING THE SEASON AFTER PENTECOST THANKSGIVING FOR CREATION

THEMES FOR OFFERING THANKS

- We give thanks vocally. Can anyone else hear your thanks? They should.
- We give thanks wholeheartedly. Does our gratitude flow from our inward being? A Spirit-filled heart overflows with thanks.
- We give thanks corporately. Do we gather with the saints to thank him corporately? God delights in people singing thanks together, and we sound a whole lot better together.
- We give thanks actively. Do we offer up our thanks to God not only with our lips, but in our lives? A thankful heart always leads to a changed life.
- We give thanks evangelistically. Do we express our thanks to God before those who do not believe? When they hear, they just might give thanks, too.
- We give thanks eternally. Are we consciously warming up to give thanks eternally? We might as well get started now!
