

WASHINGTON — Former Treasury Secretary John P. Connally was indicted Monday on five felonies in connection with the controversial 1971 Nixon Administration milk-price ruling.

Connally, 57, was charged by the Watergate special prosecutor, J. Edgar Hoover, with accepting a \$10,000 bribe from a large dairy farmer in persuading the President to grant the farmer's requests for support, and then conspiring to bribe other members of the administration and a Federal Reserve official to investigate the matter.

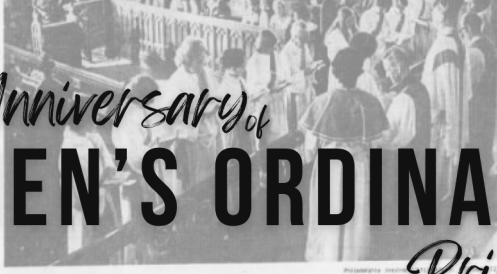
The former Treasury secretary still former governor of Texas, a Democrat turned Republican, is the fourth former Nixon Cabinet member to be charged or to plead guilty in relation to administration scandals.
