

WASHINGTON — Former Treasury Secretary John F. Connally was indicted Monday on five felonies in connection with the controversial 1971 Nixon Administration milk-price ruling.

Connally, 57, was charged by the Watergate special prosecutor, J. Edgar Hoover, with accepting a \$10,000 bribe from a large dairy of the Midwest for his help in persuading the President to grant the industry's requests for support, and then conspiring to have the industry pay a public accountants firm to investigate the matter.

The former Treasury secretary will former governor of Texas, a Democrat turned Republican, is the fourth former Nixon Cabinet member to be charged or to plead guilty in relation to administration scandals.

Indicted with Connally was Texas attorney Jake Jacobsen, 54, charged with one count of "giving an illegal

## 11 Women Are Ordained

The vote as on Saturday night, was bipartisan, with seven Republicans joining all 21 Democrats in approving the article.
